FAQ's

* Who should apply to WHSAD?

At WHSAD, we believe that ALL students who work hard can achieve their dreams! Whether you are good at math, writing, history, art, science, technology, and/or enjoy doing hands-on work, our program has something to offer you. Therefore, we welcome ALL STUDENTS to apply that have a strong desire to succeed and a particular interest in architecture, engineering, creative design and related fields.

* If I attend WHSAD, do I have to become an architect?

Even though our students are exposed to architecture and design techniques and learn valuable skills through required coursework and internship opportunities, our students pursue a variety of careers and college programs post-graduation.

* When do students start taking architecture classes?

Students begin taking architecture classes in their freshman year.

* What AP or college level courses do you offer?

We currently offer 7 AP courses: Calculus AB, Chemistry, Environmental Science, Human Geography, Pre-Calculus, Spanish Language & Culture, and US History. Our students can also participate in the College Now Program at City Tech and earn up to 12 college credits.

* What afterschool activities are offered at WHSAD?

Each year we plan afterschool activities around our students' interests. In the past, our students have participated in our campus wide PSAL sports teams, architecture club (Makerspace), game club, art club, and student newspaper.

* How many students attend WHSAD?

We are a community of approximately 600, 9-12 graders. Our student to teacher ratio is 18:1.

* What is your graduation rate?

Our 2023-2024 graduation rate was 96%

* What is the percentage of students who attend college after graduating WHSAD?

78% of the Class of 2024 planned to attend college this fall (4 Year - 52%; 2 Year - 26%)

* What are the school hours?

Our regular school day consists of 8 periods from 8:20 A.M. to 2:40 P.M. We also offer night school classes twice a week.

* Will WHSAD be having an Open House?

* Where is the school located and accessibility to public transportation?

WHSAD is located in Williamsburg, Brooklyn on Roebling Street, between N 6th and N 7th streets. We are most accessible by the L train (Bedford or Lorimer stop) or the G train (Metropolitan stop) or the B39, B44, B59, and B62 buses.

Our Program

In addition to the state required Regents courses in Math, Science, English, History and Foreign Language, we offer a unique, four- year architecture sequence aimed at providing students with specialized skills in the fields of architecture and engineering that will allow them to pursue careers in a continuously changing technological environment.

- Year 1: Foundations of Architecture and Design I & II
- Year 2: Architectural Drafting and Design I & II
- Year 3: Architectural Building and Design I & II
- Year 4: The Business of Architecture & Advanced Computer Aided Design

Students who successfully complete the CTE sequence of coursework, and pass the AutoCad exam, will earn a CTE endorsement on their high school diploma and professional certification in Autodesk.



Jalen Vasquez, Class of 2017, completed both his Bachelor's and Master's Degrees in Architecture at Howard University. Since the summer of 2022, Jalen has been a Job Captain at Gensler, the largest architecture firm in the world (and a longtime WBL partner of WHSAD). Working out of the NYC office, Jalen is overseeing a massive project of more than 1,000,000 square feet, while he continues to develop his own architectural practice and work towards his professional architecture license. He credits his time at WHSAD with helping him understand the role architects play in creating the built environment and what he could contribute to the field.

Kenny Singh, Class of 2019, participated in the Construction Skills Pre-Apprenticeship program during his senior year, which prepares students for careers in the unionized building trades. After graduation, he began his four-year apprenticeship with Local 580, the Ornamental Ironworkers union. As part of the union, Kenny works on some of the largest construction projects in NYC. His tasks are as diverse as welding gutters on high-rise buildings, to installing curtain walls on glass skyscrapers. His union training also includes 838 hours of classroom experience, upon completion of which he will become a Journeyman. He will also earn numerous certifications during the course of his apprenticeship, which will only add to his opportunities in the construction field.





Autumn Gonzalez, Class of 2017, (pictured with film director David Petersen, and WHSAD teacher Mr. Codio), graduated from CUNY's City College with a degree in Film Studies. During college, she interned with Shine Global and has worked for them since graduation. Shine is a non-profit media company that produces and distributes films about children and families worldwide, and Autumn helps to bring attention to these otherwise under-recognized films, including at this past fall's Children's Resilience in Film Awards, held at the Bryant Park Hotel.

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CTA Architects Bring Real-World Experience to WHSAD Students

September 15, 2023 (Brooklyn, NY)

CTA Architects, a certified B-corp architecture firm in Manhattan, launched a partnership with WHSAD in the 2022-2023 school year that provided students with the opportunity to work on a real-world redesign of an elementary school in the Bronx. WHSAD students worked in teams to create interior designs, floor plans, color palettes, space diagrams and other components of the redesign project. Teams were composed of students from all grade levels, with senior students acting as mentors to those in the younger grades.

Students visited CTA's offices every week, to share their ideas and get feedback and suggestions from their professional architect mentors. In between office visits, the teams worked on their designs after school and on weekends, culminating in a final presentation at the end of the school year.

In addition to refining and enhancing their architectural knowledge, the students also gained experience in presenting, working with a pre-existing space, and meeting a client's demands. In interviews on the WHSAD website, all the students commented on how this experience helped them gain confidence in their presentation skills and collaborating with others.


Senior Richard Hernandez said: "Projects like these allow for everyone to grow. I learned how to be a better leader and mentor, and I am proud to see the kind of people that my teammates are turning into. When I graduate next week, it will be those students I mentored who will turn into the next student leaders, and I can't wait to hear about the other great things that they will continue to do."

WHSAD's Incoming Freshmen Get a Jump Start on Their **Architecture Education**

September 15, 2023 (Brooklyn)

Since the summer of 2015, WHSAD's incoming 9th grade students have had the opportunity to participate in the school's SummerBridge program, which allows them to begin exploring the world of Architecture and Design prior to the start of school. Read on to learn about some of the experiences students had this past summer, and their reflections on the program.

Planter Boxes:


As part of a project with Bushwick Inlet Park, SummerBridge students used their new AutoCAD skills to design planter boxes to be built and placed in the park. After initially making sketches by hand, students created AutoCAD plans for their designs. They were also able to use satellite images to identify possible in the park where their boxes could be installed. This project culminated in a visit to the newly opened Bushwick Inlet Park.

Visits to High Rock Park and Snug Harbor: SummerBridge students had the opportunity to visit several locations on Staten Island that have been sites of WHSAD student projects in recent years. For the last two years, students have worked on trail maintenance and other outdoor interventions at High Rock Park, considered "one of the most tranquil places in New York City," and the Summer Bridge students were able to see first-hand how the projects have developed from concept to implementation. Sung Harbor is a historic and cultural center on Staten Island that students were able to visit with the goal of completing a scavenger hunt about the different architectural styles throughout the site. Students also visited the 9/11 Memorial and the on-site museum.

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Students have the opportunity to work and study at WHSAD in successive summers through the SYEP program, in addition to having some off-site internship experiences. Some of the students who stay to work in the school are the mentors to the incoming freshmen in the SummerBridge program, while others are given the opportunity to create a design project with the help and guidance of professional mentors.

RAMSA:

One of the main summer architecture experience for older students is the program sponsored by Robert A.M. Stern Architects (RAMSA). Through this six-week intensive programs, students worked to design new spaces that could be "explored" and were asked not to limit themselves to traditional ideas like "kitchen" or "bedroom". Students also have the opportunity to learn additional design software beyond AutoCAD, like Rhino and Photoshop.

Linda Foster, class of 2025, had this to say about her RAMSA experience:

"(I created) a pavilion that was intended to elicit a sense of awe and wonder in its visitors. Throughout the design process, we were able to freely use our imagination, resulting in a project that exceeded our initial expectations.

One of the most exciting and fulfilling moments during the RAMSA program was the final presentation, where all of our hard work from the past six weeks was finally put on display. Presenting in front of a room full of architects was extremely nerve-wracking, but the sense of pride and satisfaction that I felt upon sharing my project and seeing the wonderful work of my peers was unparalleled. It was truly a win in my book. Above all, being a part of such an enriching experience that will undoubtedly help me in my future architectural endeavors is a testament to how incredible and worthwhile this program is."

WHSAD Students Design Resilience Projects for High Rock Park in Staten Island

June 27, 2022 (Brooklyn, NY)

WHSAD students are taking their talents to other boroughs! Starting in the Fall of 2021, students began the first year of a multi-year partnership with the Staten Island Greenbelt Conservancy, focusing for the year on the High Rock section of the Conservancy's lands.

The year began with a series of virtual presentations from Conservancy staffers about the current status of the park, the proposals to improve the park and its accessibility, and how they envisioned WHSAD's students participating in the problem solving and design process. Throughout the winter, additional virtual sessions included lessons on the role of water in the park, the tools used in maintaining the park's resources, trails and trail maintenance, and the relationship between the Conservancy and other organizations, like NYC Parks.

After five day-long virtual sessions, it was time for the students to step away from Zoom and actually go visit High Rock Park on Staten Island. Over several visits in the spring, students were able to see the places they had been learning about, hike around the different parts of the park, and begin the hands-on work of revitalizing the trails and documenting their work.

The penultimate activity was a set of presentations by three groups of students, each competing to demonstrate why their proposal for improving High Rock Park was the best choice. In teams, the students developed proposals for making stairs safer, improving trails, and even building a small bridge across a stream. At the conclusion, one team was selected and then was given the task of executing their improvement plan.

Matthew Zaczeniuk '23, a member of the winning team, had this to say about his experience:

"I think everyone did an outstanding job preparing and presenting the projects and the decision must have been tough. After the winners were revealed, Chris...explained that our group would now be leading the operation. It was weird shifting from just an assistant to now leading the project, but...it was an incredible feeling to know that our plans were going to be implemented into the trail system and that [we] were going to leave a mark on High Rock Park."

WHSAD Students Intern with Battery Park City Authority

June 30, 2022 (Brooklyn, NY)

For the second year in a row, this spring WHSAD partnered with the Battery Park City Authority (BPCA) on an internship opportunity for students to use their AutoCAD design skills to generate plans of the various spaces in Battery Park for use by the BPCA's Permitting Office. BPCA Permit Associate John Sherzai originally approached WHSAD about creating the internship because he was confident the students would be prepared for this kind of work. How did John know? He graduated from WHSAD in 2016!

After WHSAD, John studied at the City College of New York, and during his senior year, he began working with the BPCA in their Permit Office. He quickly discovered that the maps and plans of the various spaces in Battery Park City were lacking in detail and in dire need of improvement and updates. After reaching out to WHSAD in February 2021, BPCA came on board as an internship host, and 10 students worked from late March through June to survey the spaces in Battery Park City and generate updated maps for use by the Permit Office. Eventually, the students' work will be available on the BPCA website to aid those hoping to host events in Battery Park City.

Marc Joseph, Class of 2023, had this to say about the early stages of the project:


"Working on this project has been really educational and fun, we get real-life experience on this type of work and we get paid for it. At first, we visited the site using Google Maps and Google Earth and looked at the different parts of Battery Park City sort of like a tour. On the second investigation, we began taking measurements to update the blueprint of the park. Everything has been pretty much good, and now we're putting the measurements in CAD and as we measure more parts of the park the more information we can put in CAD."

The initial set of drawings was completed in June 2021, and the work continues in 2022, with updates and revisions, as the Battery Park City Authority implements its "Resilience Action Plan" and redevelops spaces within the park area.

Project Witness Continues to Educate and Inspire WHSAD Students

June 26, 2023 (Brooklyn, NY)

For the last four years, the WHSAD community has been privileged to work with Project Witness, "a nonprofit Holocaust resource center" whose mission "merges judicious scholarship with cutting-edge media to provide thoughtprovoking Holocaust educational resources for schools, community centers, and lay readers."

For the first two years, students listened to the story and insights from Ms. Ruth Gruener, who, despite her experiences during the Holocaust, always brought a message of hope and love.

In 2022 and 2023, Ms. Toby Levy brought her story and, much like Ruth did, emphasized a message of hope and awareness. Before Ms. Levy's talk, WHSAD students and staff read about her life and dug deep into some of her wise words. Through classroom conversations, written analysis, and visual works of art, students gained knowledge about events that at first seemed to be distant but contain similarities to many modern occurrences.

In 2023, WHSAD students were invited to submit works of art and creative writing inspired by Lager Shvesters, or Camp Sisters. 9th grader Alonzo Jones, and 10th grader Cynthia Luna-Marcelino each placed 2nd in the categories of literature and art, respectively.

Ms. Cumberbatch is WHSAD's newest Freshman Architecture & Design teacher, and has the special distinction of being a WHSAD alumna, Class of 2014.

Ms. Cumberbatch credits her experience at WHSAD, particularly learning AutoCAD, for giving her an advantage in her college career.

"Learning AutoCAD at WHSAD gave me the upper hand especially when studying abroad in Italy, says Ms. Cumberbatch. "I was able to utilize the skills I learned here to create my projects a bit faster than the other kids in my class."

Furthermore, the summer internships she completed and her experience at Co-op Tech during her senior year at WHSAD taught her valuable skills such as networking, and exposed her to additional facets of the design world, including construction.

After graduating from WHSAD, Ms. Cumberbatch attended Arcadia University and later spent two years working for an architecture firm in New York.

Her experience in the field helped her realize that "college doesn't prepare you for real world scenarios." Because of this, her goal for her course at WHSAD is "to equip students with the right software and technical skills that are currently used in the field today."

According to Ms. Cumberbatch: "Most times, companies are looking for people who have 10 years of experience from an entry level employee. So why not give them what they want. By teaching our students how to read construction documents, to understand ADA compliance, to create finish boards, and to design development packages, they will be ahead of the curve.

WHSAD Senior Wins 2nd POSSE Scholarship in 4 Years

June 2023 (Brooklyn, NY)

The Posse Foundation identifies, recruits, and trains individuals with extraordinary leadership potential. The Posse model is rooted in the belief that a small, diverse group of talented students—a Posse—carefully selected and trained, can serve as a catalyst for individual and community development.

Jordan Dove, class of 2023, was selected through a highly competitive application and interview process as a member of the 2nd ever cohort of Posse Scholars to study at California Institute for the Arts. In addition to the traditional Posse application, Jordan also had to submit a portfolio of his artwork for consideration. The CalArts Posse program was launched in 2022, with funding from the Miranda Family Fund, created by Lin-Manuel Miranda to further support students in their study of the creative arts.

Jonah Vazquez, class of 2020, was selected as a Posse Scholar at Vanderbilt University in Tennessee. During an interview with Jonah, we asked how did it feel to find out you were a finalist for the Posse Scholarship. He responded, "*Excited, very, very, excited. The whole process was a huge ego boost, as I got chosen again and again out of many other candidates through the first and second interviews. Being a finalist was like an extra ego boost because you're one of the special selected 20 out of the 3,000 something that applied. Plus, you have the opportunity of going to an elite school, like Vanderbilt, tuition free for four whole years, so, yes, I was absolutely ecstatic."*
