The Glass Castle Clubs

The Glass Castle by Jeannette Walls is a memoir of Walls' childhood, growing up with a complex family dynamic. Her and her three siblings struggle with the burden of extreme poverty, bullying, alcoholism, and constantly moving around. While their childhood was far from easy, they grew closer from their shared struggles. She mentions how her father always inspired her to be brave and dream big, and her mother instilled in her beliefs from ethics to religion. The story displays the complexity of a loving, yet dysfunctional family, through their action packed lives and deep connections.

The memoir follows Walls starting from her first memory in a trailer park in Arizona, moving around through the western United States, living in a small Appalachian town, and then finally escaping to New York City. Some say the center of the story is the complicated relationship between her and her dad, but my biggest take away was the resilience of herself and her siblings. They found creative ways to make money and find food when they didn't have much, and they had fun running around the desert looking for shiny rocks and biking through Phoenix, Arizona. When they moved too much to make longlasting friendships, they still had each other. They learned to have fun on their own and be there for one another when no one else was.

If you like nonfiction, memoirs, and coming-of-age stories, I highly recommend you read The Glass Castle. It is a beautifully written tale of struggle and perseverance.


Who: Interviewee, Mr. Codio, the WHSAD Director of Industry Partnerships
